Hyoseris radiata - a common yellow composite with stepped pinnate leaves Urospermum dalechampii - a large soft yellow composite with dark centres. Lovely

Reichardia tingitana - a glabrous yellow daisy with a dark centre. Son Bou

- E. Launea cervicornis spiny shrublet on exposed rocky coasts Aetheorhiza bulbosa - common yellow composite on dunes
- Sonchus oleraceus (Smooth Sow-thistle)
 - S. tenerrimus the common inland Sow-thistle. Variable

S. maritimus - the coastal equivalent

Posidonia oceanica (Neptune Grass) - storms brought up piles of this 'sea-weed' also fibrous 'sea-balls'

Pancratium maritimum (Sea Daffodil) - leaves in plenty on sandy shores
